Transparent Pie Reading Guide


Pietography a Brief Introduction:

Pietography is the practice of interpreting symbols and hidden messages that lie withing the patterns of crumbs and smears on a plate after you've eaten a slice of pie. We all know pie is delicious, but like tarot card reading, it can also be a useful tool. In divination, both the reader (also known as the seer) and in this case pie eater (also known as the querent), must focus their intentions. You can do this with any pie, but Transparent Pie tends to work best ... too much fruit can muddle the thoughts trying to pass through it.

Setting the Stage:

The seer must sit across from the querent (or person who is eating the pie). Both should focus their thoughts. As the querent consumes their slice of pie, they should ask a question. Keep in mind that vague questions often produce vague answers. In the beginning, you should not ask more than one question. Being specific and clear with your thoughts is critical. When the querent is done eating their slice of pie, they should place the fork on the table parallel to the plate. Think of the plate like a clock. The fork should be resting at six o'clock. The plate itself should be round and not have too many patterns. To read accurately, you must start at the top of the plate and move around it in a clockwise pattern. Note that sometimes letters or numbers may appear on the plate. Depending upon the question asked, letters can denote the initials of a person or place. Numbers are up for interpretation, based on the question the querent has asked.

Patterns and Interpretations:



Hundreds of shapes and patterns can be produced, each with their own unique meaning. Here are a few of the most significant.

Ants – small cluster of crumbs at the base of the plate, symbolizes allies and the importance of a collective effort.

Blade - a bit of custard or crumbs that end in a point, symbolizes danger.

Bowl - curved streaks of custard or a curved line of crumbs, symbolizes difficulties you might soon fall into.

Clouds - dollops of custard on the upper region of the plate, symbolizes dark times heading your way.

Crescent Moon - in the form of custard or crumbs, symbolizes good fortune and prosperity.

Crossbones – a crossing of custard streaks or two lines of crumbs, symbolizes illness or serious danger.

Dominoes – series of touching crumbs, symbolizes connected actions that will bring great or sudden change.

Flock – a cluster of crumbs on the upper region of the plate, similar to a flock of birds, indicates you are heading in the right direction.

Flowers – custard with crumbs on top, symbolizes romance or recognition from someone important. Fruit – a cluster of crumbs close together on the lower region of the plate, similar to fruit falling from a tree, symbolizes some sort of financial gain.

Guard - crumbs that fall outside of the plate, symbolizes friends and allies.

Logs – in the form of crumbs that are slightly long like pieces of wood, symbolizes benefits or good luck. Minus – a fleck of crust that looks like a minus sign, symbolizes time is running out on important decisions.

Peaks – a point of custard or pointed crumbs, like mountains, symbolizes choices and a possible change in direction.

Pennies – in the form of round custard streaks or rings of crumbs, symbolizes money or gifts you may be receiving.

Road – a streak or smear of custard, symbolizing a journey. If it's on the southern region of the plate, the journey indicates the querent is traveling somewhere. If it's in the northern region, then someone connected to the querent will be taking a journey.

Rope – bits of crumbs and custard that are intertwined, symbolizes friends and enemies are closely connected.

Snake - in the form of a short squiggle of custard or crumbs, symbolizes betrayal or enemies.

Wall - in the form of a larger shard or crust crumb, symbolizes obstacles one must overcome.

Waves - squiggly line of custard, symbolizes information coming your way or good news.
